Growing to Serve



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Safety in an Unpredictable World: K9 Care and Safety

TEXSAR's K9s are an important component of our team and it's critical that we ensure their safety is top of mind before, during and after each deployment. We'll discuss the process TEXSAR handlers use to keep our dogs healthy and ready for service. Much of this applies to your pet, too.

An important way to keep our K9s mission ready at all times is through regular appointments with their veterinarian. Dogs should be current on all recommended vaccinations as there is always a good possibility of encountering loose dogs or wildlife during deployments that could transmit diseases. Heartworm prevention and flea, tick and mosquito repellants are an important part of keeping our pups disease free. In the event a K9 does develop an illness related to a search, it's important that the vet has baseline information to compare to.

It's been said that driving to and from a deployment can be the most dangerous time for first responders and this is also true for our K9s. A high quality K9 crate that's designed specifically to transport our pups and has been rigorously tested for durability on impact protects our dogs in case of a crash. It's important to have something on the outside of the vehicle that alerts responders that a K9 is inside the vehicle. Inside the vehicle there should be an immediately visible container with vital information about the dog, handler information and an emergency contact.

Weather conditions play a major role in determining how we prepare for each mission. It's important that we acclimate both ourselves and our K9s to the heat and humidity, as well as to winter weather extremes, by gradually extending the dog's time outside during training and play time as the conditions change.



Prior to each mission we want the dogs to be well hydrated so we make sure that they have continuous access to fresh, clean water at all times. Dogs should be drinking ½ to 1 ounce of liquid per pound each day but most only drink a portion of that, especially when inside all day. We can encourage drinking by adding something tasty like chicken broth to their kibble. When in the field we stop for water breaks approximately every 15 minutes.

On deployments where there is ice or snow on the ground we may want to protect our K9's paws with booties. There are several varieties but it's important to make sure they fit well and provide adequate traction as our dogs often work in rough or slippery terrain. Another important consideration is that dogs only have sweat glands in the pads of their feet so we don't want to use booties when temperature and humidity are high.

It's important to watch for signs of overheating like excessive panting or drooling, tongue hanging out and wider at the bottom, dark red gums, or seeking out shade. Check for dehydration by pinching the skin between the shoulder blades to see if it 'tents' rather than returning quickly to normal. Working dogs often have a microchip under the skin with a handheld reader that displays internal temperature. Because our K9s spend a portion of their time in our vehicles during a deployment, we ensure they have good ventilation by leaving the back hatch, and/or windows, open and battery operated fans attached to their crates. We also drape a reflective sun shade over the hatch and windows to prevent exposure to direct sunlight in addition

to parking in the shade when possible. The temperature inside the vehicle can be monitored through a device in the car that connects to an app on your phone.

Injuries in the field are always a concern so we want to be sure that we are able to

provide first aid as quickly as possible. A portable K9 first aid kit should include many of the same things that we carry for human purposes. These include gauze, adhesive tape, alcohol and antibiotics and tweezers. We also include items more specific to K9 needs such as a muzzle to ensure an injured dog doesn't bite out or fear or pain and a sling to carry an injured dog out of the field. A tourniquet is also a must have item but the Combat Applied Tourniquets typically recommended for human use are not ideal for K9s. Tourniquets made specifically for K9s are a better option but the rubber band style tourniquets used when you get your blood drawn also work well.

Our K9s may be exposed to a variety of toxins so it's important for handlers and flankers to be on the lookout for these during every mission. Water that is stagnant may have toxic algae or fungus that can cause a dog to decline rapidly. Water contaminated with chemicals or fecal matter is also a major concern during flood and hurricane deployments. If we expect that a dog has ingested a potentially toxic substance we need to get them to an emergency vet for monitoring and treatment right away. The ASPCA operates an Animal Poison Control Center hotline where you can get immediate advice around the clock. Even walking through contaminated water carries the risk of absorbing a toxin so dogs need to go through a decontamina-

> tion process as quickly as possible.

Flankers play an important role in ards like barbed wire. unstable surfaces, snakes and other wildlife. While we want our dogs to range independently from their handler to ensure maximum coverage,

helping keep the K9s safe by watching for potential haz-

we also want them to have good emergency stop and recall commands so that we can help them avoid dangerous situations. Because we periodically respond to flooded areas we want our dogs to be strong swimmers. K9 floatation devices should be used when in swiftwater situations or on a boat.

These considerations are important not only for SAR K9s but also for any working dog or family pet. The American Red Cross has an online pet first aid course for any that are interested in being even better prepared to take care of their pet in the case of an emergency.

Mission Matters

The performance of TEXSAR volunteers as they serve the needs of agencies and partners continues to impress and TEXSAR is busier than ever before thanks to its reputation. The quality of work is no accident; it is the result of ongoing training, maintenance of equipment, and acquisition of appropriate assets. More and more, TEXSAR is becoming the go-to nonprofit for search, rescue, recovery and related missions. One of the basic skills that all TEXSAR members learn is Wilderness Search and Rescue.
